472	FAR(adv)	Uzak, Çok Example: Those who stand far distant from it might find it easy to pronounce upon her fate.

473	FATIGUE(n)	Yorgun, Bitkin Example: It is characterised by overwhelming mental and physical fatigue accompanied by a wide range of other symptoms.
474	FEARSOME(adj)	Dehşetli, Korkunç Example: 'Like you, we've had some fearsome arguments about colour schemes, carpets and curtains.
475	FEEBLE(adj)	Zayıf, Kuvvetsiz Example: After that, I was far too weak and feeble to lift a glass.
476	FEVER(n)	Ateş, Hararet, Humma Example: Aspirin is good for relieving pain, reducing fevers, and reducing inflammation caused by injury or arthritis.

478	FISCAL(adj)	Mali Example: The government has a fiscal revenue projection of a billion dollars.
